Weekly Parshas

Beshalach **Exodus 13:17 - 17:16**

God leads the Israelites out of Egypt, appearing as a cloud by day and a pillar of fire by night. The Egyptians pursue the Israelites to the shore of the Sea of Reeds and appear to have them cornered. The sea parts for the Israelites, who cross through on dry land, but the waters crash down upon Pharaoh's army. Having been saved by God, the Children of Israel break into a song of praise, acclaiming God's victory and affirming their faith in God. Miriam, Moses' sister, leads the women in song and dance. (This shabbat derives its name, Shabbat Shira, from these songs.)

The Israelites wander for three days without fresh water. They come to Marah and encounter bitter water there. God tells Moses to throw a branch into the water and it becomes potable. Subsequently the Israelites complain that they want meat to eat. God sends quail in excessive quantities, and in the morning the Israelites are provided with manna, which will sustain them throughout their years in the wilderness. As the manna does not keep overnight, the people need to gather manna each day, but miraculously, the double portion gathered on Friday remains fresh through Shabbat. At Refidim the Israelites again complain about the lack of fresh water. Moses cries out to God, who tells him to take his rod and strike a rock to produce water.

While at Refidim, the Amalekites attack the Children of Israel. Joshua recruits an army to launch a counter-attack. Moses ascends a hilltop and while he keeps his hands aloft, the tide of battle favors the Israelites. As Moses tires, Aaron and Hur support his arms until the Israelites are victorious.

Yitro **Exodus 18:1 - 20:23**

Tziporah, Moses' wife, their two sons and Moses' father-in-law, Jethro, join the Israelites in Refidim. Jethro, the

Midianite Priest, acknowledges God's power and offers sacrifices to Him. It is he who suggests to Moses that a judicial system be set up in which less complicated matters are handled by other judges and Moses will adjudicate only the most difficult cases.

The Children of Israel arrive at the foot of Mount Sinai and prepare to receive God's revelation. Amidst thunder, lightning and shofar blasts, all those present experience God's presence when the Ten Commandments are made known.

The people are overawed and overwhelmed by what they have witnessed; they cannot bear more. So revelation continues with Moses serving as the intermediary, and additional laws dealing with various aspects of ritual worship conclude this week's sidra.

Mishpatim **Exodus 21:1 - 24:18**

Following the Decalogue (Ten Commandments), a series of laws in concise form is given to the Israelites. These include regulations governing the master-servant relationship, capital offenses, bodily injury, and damage to property, negligence, theft, marital law, and treatment of the stranger, orphan, widow, debtor and animals. The application and effectiveness of these laws is dependent upon the integrity of witnesses and judges; their truthfulness and objectivity must be assured.

Mitzvot regulating food and agriculture are also dealt with – first fruits and firstborn must be dedicated to God. Meat of an animal torn by beasts may not be eaten. The land must lie fallow every seventh year. Everyone – including servants – must rest on the Sabbath. Pilgrimage to the Sanctuary must be made on Passover, Shavuot and Sukkot. A kid may not be boiled in its mother's milk.

The people enthusiastically accept God's laws. Moses, the priests and the elders witness a mystical vision of

God's glory. God commands Moses to ascend Mount Sinai to receive the tablets on which the Ten Commandments are inscribed. While Moses remains on the mount for forty days, Aaron and Hur will govern the people.









Terumah **Exodus 25:1 - 27:19**









Moses is commanded by God to construct a portable Sanctuary in accordance with detailed instructions about its size, its materials, and the various ancillary ritual objects with which it is to be furnished. For these purposes the people were asked to make a free-will offering (Terumah) of metals, fabrics, skins, wood, precious stones, oil and spices.

The outer court of the Sanctuary was a rectangular structure without a roof that was surrounded by curtains. It contained an altar for burnt offerings and a washstand for the priests. All Israelites could enter this area.

The Tabernacle was divided into two sections, separated by a veil. Only priests were permitted to enter this area. It contained an altar for incense, the seven-branched Menorah and a table for the showbread.

The inner chamber of the Tabernacle, the Holy of Holies, contained the Ark of the Covenant; the high priest was accorded access, but only on Yom Kippur.

Our sidra provides specific instructions about the design of each of these structures and their furnishings.

The CORNER of Hebrew

My Perush to the Parasha of the root Pa.Ra.Sh [פרש]

The term Parasha [פרשה] means a portion of a book or a chapter and we also commonly use it to describe the segment of the Torah, which we read each week of the year. This word though, has additional meanings such as a specific story or a case, which sometimes may indicate a scandal of any sort, including an affair. The root Pa.Ra.Sh [פרש] has even further diverse uses. Liphrosh [לפרוש] means to leave, to retire or to withdraw. Prushim [פרושים], the Hebrew name for the Pharisees sect of the first century, were named this way because they were different and separated from the rest. Perush [פירוש] or Parshanut [פרשנות], which mean explanation or commentary (many times of a Biblical or a Halachic term), are also derived from the root Pa.Ra.Sh [פרש]. It seems that the common denominator for most of the terms that use this root is a specific portion or section of a book or story, of people, or an explanation, since any Perush is as an opinion, which can reflect only one face/portion of the multifaceted truth. With this demonstration of the pluralistic nature of our language and culture I will end my parshanut for this time.
